## "White Rose '95" Update

Things are shaping up very well for next years' convention.

We have all the clinic slots filled. Some of the clinicians scheduled to come include: Allen McClelland, Tony Koester, the Division's own Tom Lowry, some Master Model Railroaders or people working towards M.M.R. and representatives from major magazines. We've called in some favors to get such a talented group. A first for M.E.R. conventions will be a special foum where several of the big names will be together in a panel format to discuss model railroad issues. You will

have the opportunity to ask the panel any questions you may have! Another first for M.E.R. conventions will be a Motor car/Speeder fan trip! The trip will cover historical sites along the old Northern Central line - formerly Penn Central/PRR before Hurricane Agnes wiped out key spots. The trip will include 1 or 2 photo runbys and a lunch. People with sensitive hearing may want to bring ear protection, the 2-stroke cars are rather loud. This is limited to 45 people on a first come, first served basis. There will also be a bonus trip to Williams Grove

Amusement Park on Satuday.14 people will bid on passes to learn to run the steam engine at the park. This will last 30 minutes for each "Engineer" and they will actually run the engine during the training period. They will also receive a certificate on completion from the park.

Other trips include; an excursion on the Middletown & Hummelstown R.R., a tour of the Brunner's Island power plant where they use a rotary coal dumper, and a historical tour of York, first capitol of the U.S.

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#### LAYOUT DESIGN AND CONCEPT PART 1

an article on track planning, I thought it would be no problem. The more I thought about it, the more I realized how difficult it was going to be. Where do I start, how detailed do I want to be? I have been designing and discussing layout design for over 25 years. Many of them have been constructed and have operated fine. The number one goal of any trackplan is to design a railroad that s within your time and means to complete. Maintenance after completion is another major consideration.

Before you get out your paper and scale rule, we have to talk about concept. The biggest mistake I've seen over the years by designers is drawing a trackplan without having any idea what type of railroad they wanted to build. Get out a notepad and make which area of the country and what some basic decisions now.

prototype modelling you might want ite. I would suggest you narrow the to consider. The most diehard modeler may want to take a section of his favorite railroad and reproduce it as close rolling stock have to fall into this peas possible. Most of us are going to be riod, but structures and details (cars, happier taking our prototype and trucks, people, etc.) should.

When I was first asked to write modelling our favorite scenes and freelancing the rest. You may find you only want to model the equipment, maybe a few structures, to get the feel of the railroad. It is also possible to combine more than one prototype to your basic concept. I suggest you be very careful with your choice here, the closer you get to the prototype the more advanced your modelling skills have to be to get results you will be happy with. It is very important not to set your goals too high. I have seen many railroads never completed because the builder could not model up to the standards he setup before starting construction. The fictional railroad has the advantage of modelling with more freedom without justifying why the prototype did not do the same.

Now is the time to decide type of terrain you wish to model. Next There are different degrees of to consider is what era is your favorperiod down to about ten years. This does not mean your locomotives or

By now you should have a good idea what you want from your railroad.

Now we will try to fit your dream railroad into that railroad room that just appeared to get too small. Measure your railroad room and prepare a floorplan overlaid with a one inch grid. The best scale for me is 1"=1'. If the drawing becomes two big drop the scale down to 1/2'=1'. Make plenty of photocopies because these are also your doodle sheets.

In the next issue we are ready to look at the railroad room and decide how we can best make use of our available space. We will discuss minimum radius and turnout size. Aisle space and maximum grade will also be covered. Hopefully we can even start working with paper and pencil. My goal in writing this article is to present my method of layout design. While it certainly is not the only method, it is the best method I have found so far. I welcome all comments, pro or con, on the subject. Please mail them to me care of the SIDETRACKS editor and he will pass them on to me. I will try to include them in future articles as best I can.


